MENTAL HEALTH MATTERS

The month of May has a week designated to Mental Health Awareness; in October, we celebrate World Mental Health Day; November is designated Men's Mental Health Awareness Month; the UK has a Mental Health Act (1983) and there is also a Mental Capacity Act (2005).

Did you know that your state of mind matters?

- That if you are feeling unwell you may not be able to function at your best?
- That you can experience burnout?
- That work can cause stress that makes it difficult to live life well.
- That some children experience adverse childhood experiences (ACES)?
- That menopause can cause depression, swift changes in mood and high levels of anxiety?

In Jamaica, there is a proverb that says "Doah yuh cyaan stop flyin' crow feader from drop, yuh can 'inder crow from meck nes' pon yuh head top". The translation says, 'although you cannot stop a flying crow from dropping his feathers, you can stop the crow from making a nest on your head'.

In other words, life will have problems and difficulties and stress, but we must do what we can to minimize, reduce or manage the negative impact ('although you may not be able to stop some problems, you can put steps in place to prevent them from having a very negative effect').

As God's children, the manual for life (the Bible-God's word) has a lot of tips to help with our mental health.

Music: When King Saul was sad and depressed, he called for the musicians to play soothing music.

('whenever the spirit from God troubled Saul, David would pick up his lyre and play, and Saul would then be relieved, feel better, and the evil spirit would leave him' 1 Samuel 16:23 Holman Christian Standard Bible). Music is a great antidote for good mental health.

Sleep: Elijah was experiencing burnout and depression; God caused him to fall asleep; Once rested, he saw things differently. Sleep deprivation is a multiplier of poor mental health. Once you sleep, you are better able to see things in perspective not as overwhelming, unanswerable problems. Take your rest; sleep; enjoy the Sabbath rest.

Pray: talk to God about our problems and recognize that as he is God he can handle all our problems and we should not worry about them because we are unable to solve them. We are encouraged to cast all or our cares on Jesus because he cares for us (1Peter 5:7). Jesus invites to come to him when we are weary and heavy laden (Matt 11:28-30), when our mental health is low. He is the answer. He will give us PEACE.

On the 150th anniversary (2023) of Spafford's song 'it is well with my soul' let us hold dear to our hearts, the words and sentiments of the song that tells us to have God's peace during turbulent distressing times.

About Us

The Stoke Newington Seventh-day Adventist Church can trace its roots from its humble beginnings in 1965, in the home of former members at Mildenhall Road, Lower Clapton. It was there that Bible Studies and Prayer Meetings took place attended by around 12 people.

This group, drawn from the Holloway Church and the former New Gallery Centre, soon grew large enough to seek alternative accommodation. The group stepped out in faith to a rented building – The Friends Meeting Hall (our current site). As time went on, a request was made to the South England Conference for a pastor and this group was placed under the pastoral care of Pastor Nicholson.

By the 1st January 1966, the membership grew to about 60 and the Stoke Newington group was organized into a church.

50+ years later, we are still here - Thanking God!! Of course over the years the membership has grown and people have come and gone. Whoever has been in membership of Stoke Newington, previously, currently and to come, will continue to be a beacon of light in our community.
